edar Hill Cemetery is home to a variety of wildlife including song birds, turkeys, geese, blue heron, deer, squirrels, chipmunks, turtles and groundhogs. Much of Cedar Hill's wildlife is found in the Ornamental Foreground that secludes the burial sections of the cemetery from the roadway. This natural habitat of water and woodlands contains more than 65 acres of open space landscaping and ponds.

The Ornamental Foreground is a favorite spot for bird watching throughout the year. Each December, devoted birders conduct the annual Christmas Bird Count at Cedar Hill. Notable finds in 2012 include the Barred Owl, a species not seen in the cemetery before. Six ravens were also spotted and the often hard-to-find Yellow-Bellied Sapsucker made an appearance. The day after the Bird Count, a Horned Grebe, which winters along the Atlantic coast and is not usually seen on smaller bodies of water, was spotted on Llyn Mawr, the foreground's largest pond.

Cedar Hill invites you to bird watch on your own or join one of our guided walks. On May 4th, Jay Kaplan from Roaring Brook Nature Center leads his annual bird walk. Last year, the group saw and/or heard 55 species. Highlights included Scarlet Tanager, Indigo Bunting and Peregrine Falcon. New this year, Joan Morrison, Professor of Biology and Environmental Science at Trinity College, will lead an autumn bird walk on October

5th. During the search for birds, Professor Morrison will discuss her work studying urban birds and their habitats.


